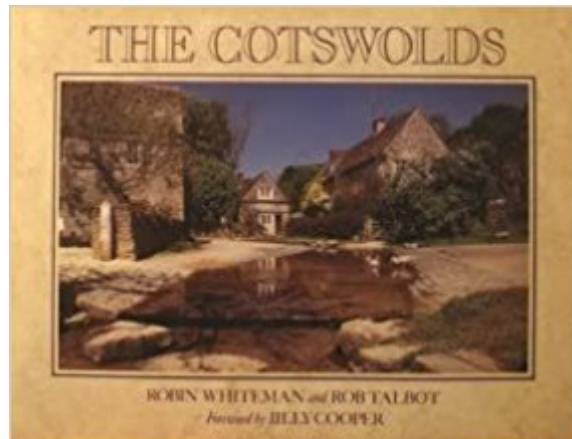




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# The Cotswolds

This book consists of a relatively short introduction on a few pages, followed by hundreds of photographs. The author visited Cotswolds many times with the parents and then moved to Cotswolds and lived there over 4 years, hiking and driving around and taking pictures. Each picture comes with a little description. The beginning of the book, the story of the author and the history of Cotswolds, is fabulous. The author is very passionate about this area of England, and this shows. It was a great pleasure to read the introduction. From this point, it goes mainly downhill. The author used a nice camera, a generous set of lenses, and a bunch of filters to take pictures. Unfortunately, no matter how good your equipment is, you can't "buy a picture". There are people with a special vision of the world who were born to be photographers. When you see a picture taken by such a professional - no matter what camera they used - all you can say is "Wow!". Most of us do not belong to this category... We take just OK pictures... And so does the author. When you google for images of Cotswolds, you find pictures which look so amazing that they tempt you to change your travel plans and spend all your vacation in that part of England. When you look at pictures in this book, you start thinking - is this all? Do I really want to go there? It's kind of boring in the Cotswolds... To make things even worse, this book was printed in color with mediocre quality at best. The pictures look pretty awful quality-wise. I do not know what one would use this book for. I did not find it inspiring to visit Cotswolds, it is not that detailed in the introduction, it is not good for memories since the pictures are not that good... My recommendation - look elsewhere.
