

There are not many American men who have ever earned the right to wear the Navy SEAL Trident. Only some of that elite group have served with valor in combat against our foreign enemies far down range. And damned few indeed have continued the close-quarters battle at home against our domestic enemies, which is a far trickier battlefield. Carl Higbie is one of those few. Carl Higbie was a Special Operator with SEAL Team Ten, Echo Platoon. He deployed twice in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Carl published his first memoir, *Battle on the Homefront* shortly after his second deployment. He is a regular contributor on Fox News and CNN. Higbie ran for Connecticut's 4th Congressional District in 2014. He resides in Greenwich, CT. Brandon Caro was a Navy corpsman (combat medic) who deployed to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in 2006-2007. His first novel, *Old Silk Road*, was published by Post Hill Press. His work has been featured in *The New York Times*, *The Daily Beast*, *WhiteHot Magazine*, and others. He resides in Austin, TX.

Three Navy SEALs were accused of roughing up the "Butcher of Fallujah" after his capture in Iraq. A young MP that was guarding the Butcher of Fallujah claimed the three SEALs beat up the terrorist. An Army officer that was out to condemn the SEALs for misconduct wanted to ruin the men's Navy careers. But the three SEALs insisted on a Courts Martial of their peers and were found not guilty on all charges. This same Army officer that was out to get the Three SEALs was awarded another STAR for his efforts! As a result of the ordeal two of the SEALs resigned from the Navy and the third man remained on active duty.

Carl Higbie is an authentic and courageous American patriot and warrior. This book is 'not another'

personal account of war with attendant details of horrors of war. Carl treats such experiences with dignity and respect for the casualties. The book is a refreshing balance of salient experiences during his pre-military life, SEAL training and deployments to Iraq with some unexpected twists that, to me at least, are shocking. Without offering spoilers, Carl leads you along as he encountered the long arm of the American PC culture with its priorities that (may) leave you shocked, disgusted or smiling, depending on your beliefs. For me, I wasn't smiling, but I sure was rooting and cheering for Carl the whole way. And just when you think it's safe to come out, you'll be on a roller coaster ride as he takes on the deliberate smoke and mirror, obstructionist machinations of none other than the Department of the Navy. Supposed brothers turned against one of their very own for reasons dishonorable. Pretty amazing stuff. Carl Higbie is a first class fighter in every sense of the word. This book's worth reading.

As a Combat Vet myself I found it to be to the point, with a sense of humor that, is true to form. The reality that is brought to the light of the dysfunctional system that needs to be corrected along with the "Just play the game" reality of life in transitioning back to life outside the uniform is a breath of reality. I understand personally the very reality of trying to change a system that is broken and the retaliatory actions that are polity snubbing of the very politics, the players are hypocritical from day one over. I personally honor the courage and conviction in aspiring others to stand for what's right, with the Team Looking Out mentality the Seals are known for, addressing the real issues Carl has faced.

I don't usually read books like this but I wanted to hear the story of someone who had made great sacrifices in his life and was betrayed by a system that should have backed him up. It can happen in civilian life too. Carl Higby's story is inspirational. Even when betrayed we can have the strength to pursue truth and fight for justice. There are also some angels working in the government willing to help!

A very fascinating story! The Seals are known for their tough image but when it comes to dealing with superiors, regardless of their integrity or lack thereof, offending them is very risky and likely to trigger their animosity and resistance, if not their vindictiveness. Treating even the corrupt with tact and dignity, complying with orders that don't compromise ones integrity while firmly standing ones ground may achieve more. Then go after our foreign enemies with all your awesome cunning and might!

I have seen Carl on Megan Kelley, Fox News. I was impressed by his commitment to our Country, also, his integrity in standing up for his principles of truthfulness, and doing the right thing for the right reason. I failed to understand why the Navy was uncooperative with him after he had deployed on two combat missions. I'm thankful to learn that he did publish his first Book. Sad, that he did not stay in the military, and continue as a Seal.

Provides a great narrative as to what's wrong with the military structure specifically within the SEAL community but also elaborates on a greater wide spread problem throughout the military of the disconnect between leadership who give orders and those that carry them out.
