


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The Killer Angels: The Classic Novel Of The Civil War (The Civil War: 1861-1865 Book 2)

Killer Angels is the second of three historical novels in Michael Shaara’s epic telling of the story of the American Civil War. They books are described by the author as "historical fictions", which

means he tells his well-studied version of what happened as truthfully as possible in the form of a novel where we look into the interactions and events of notable people involved in the war, particularly the Generals. The format is highly effective and it really lets Shaara put us in the middle of the battles, the middle of the planning sessions, let's us feel what it may be like to be marched to death, to see your blood brother's leg amputated, to see truces called to clear the dead and injured off the battle field when farm animals come to feast upon them, let's us feel like we may be experiencing just a modicum of the horror that the men and women of the civil war experienced. Shaara's prose draws you right in and leaves you there to where you feel like you are watching more than reading, and every once while he reminds you, it's only a novel. Then you take pause, and you realize that for millions of people, it was nothing less than real.

Tones, accents, and nuances are captured and much to my delight as I thoroughly enjoyed the movie. Additionally, Shaara's glimpses of the thoughts and perspectives of the "players" enhances it all. I go through audio books pretty quickly during my commute. This one was so good I found myself sitting in front of my house a few extra minutes each evening to hear just a little more! Highly recommend.

I've found from reading non-fiction books on the Civil War that the author did a great job of accurately portraying the personalities, including demeanor and quirks, of the main characters that were largely responsible for the outcome of this battle. He obviously knew his subjects, and the

battle, well. And although much of the dialogue is fictionalized, their interactions and decisions, and how they came about them, as described in this book, also hold up well. Although I read very few fiction-related books, my keen interest in this battle and the Civil War came about because of this fine book, which is what I feel was a primary objective of the author. It was not designed to focus on everyone who had a key role in this battle (because there are others), and it was not designed to be an in-depth account of the battle. However, this book helps personalize it and provides a unique perspective in how leaders on both sides interacted and how their unique personalities and feelings, including jealousies, arrogance, over-confidence, and personal courage, led to the decisions that largely shaped the outcome of a battle considered by many to be the turning point of the war. This book is well-balanced in telling both sides of the conflict, easy to read and comprehend, and would be a great history assignment from junior high on up. Insightful for the Civil War novice and the well-read alike.

I read this book in high school more out of obligation than any genuine interest. But now being older and having traveled to many Civil War battlefields and now residing in Northern Virginia, I picked this book up again. It really humanizes an event that changed the course of U.S. history and therefore, modern human history. Had Gettysburg never occurred the way it did, the entire global geopolitical system would be fundamentally different. The United States would not have been the full participant in global affairs that it has been because it would not have existed in its currently understood form. Michael Shaara's book gives an emotionally charged account of a world altering event. *The Killer Angels* is a triumph of American literature.

It's a war. It's tragic. The beauty of this book is that it delves into the real or imagined feelings of the characters involved and makes you really stand in their shoes (or no shoes as the case may be). Such heroism, such unfortunate circumstances, so much death and heartbreak. I think the point is well made when a couple of the main characters question what the CAUSE even was that started them on this quest. Not being very familiar with the Civil War, I had some confusions through maybe half of the book as to who was on which side but by the end I knew much more about the war than I did previously, making this an excellent educational tool. Suggest that you have a kindle or device that displays the maps and troop positions at full size, those diagrams would be very helpful, but were too small to see on my paperwhite kindle. Thinking of getting the paper copy just to see those.

I am fascinated by the civil war. Over my life I have read dozens of books on all details of and about

the war and issues before and after. Of all those books the one I come back to again and again is the Killer Angels. It is beautifully written, poignant and a gripping page turner.

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
