

The dragon grows by leaps and bounds, until Billy dares to pet the attention-seeking creature and it shrinks back down into an adoring little lap dragon. Jack Kent has illustrated many children's book favorites including Golden Books' Mrs. Mooley, Simon and Schuster's The Caterpillar and the Polliwog, and Random

House's Jack Kent's Happy-Ever-After Book. From the Hardcover edition.

I like it but the message at the end is a little confusing. ***Spoiler Alert*** It's about a boy that wakes up to see a dragon and when he tell his mom she says there's no such thing as dragons. So the boy spends the rest of the book trying to ignore the dragon since his mom tells him there's no such thing and it would be funny to believe in something that wasn't really there. The dragon gets larger until it gets so large it fills the house and walks away with it. Then when the dragon gets acknowledged by the family the dragon goes back down to pet size. The moral being that ignoring something just because it's difficult to admit will only make the issue grow out of hand and more difficult to deal with? That's what I'm guessing at least. Like, if you did bad on a test but don't want to tell your parents, well, you still did bad and it will effect your overall grade and your parents will only find out in the end anyways so you might as well tell them upfront. If you wait you will likely be in more trouble and if you tell them right away they can help you and will be more understanding. That's my takeaway from the book but again, it tells this moral in a difficult way that I'm not sure kids will immediately understand without having to explain it. Took me a few reads myself to get to that conclusion.

I found this book in the children's library at our church and immediately went home to order a copy for my granddaughter who's turning five. The story teaches an important lesson about the value of acknowledgement, attention and appreciation. But there's nothing preachy about it. It's just fun. And the illustrations are delightful.

This was my sons favorite book when he was little. (Now 32!!) Last year I read it to a then young 5 year old friend and he loved it. I searched everywhere and was told it was out of print. So glad it is circulating again. How the times change. Thirty two years ago it was \$1.29! :)
